GRASSROOTS MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH LEADERSHIP TRAINING To Improve Infant Mortality Rates, Ask The Women®

BACKGROUND

Indiana is the seventh worse state for infant deaths (babies dying before their first birthday). Over the past 5 years in Indiana, nearly 600 babies have died each year, that means a baby every dies nearly every 14 hours in our state. It is time to build communities that support healthy pregnancies, infants and families. Grassroots Maternal and Child Health Leaders are needed to lead these community efforts!

OUR APPROACH

We train and mentor grassroots maternal and child health leaders (GMCHL) who are skilled in bringing about social changes that improve birth outcomes for their communities. Grassroots leaders are best qualified to address poor birth outcomes in their communities, because they are a part of community. Our leaders become skilled in: telling their story and that of their neighborhoods, advancing policies to help their community, leading community development efforts.



PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Throughout the year long program, each leader gets training and mentoring in:

- Community leadership
- Addressing the causes and consequences of infant death
- Promoting health equity
- Using media to tell a story
- Policy advocacy and development
- Community health promotion

Leaders can work on the following types of projects:

- · Serving families in affordable housing communities
- Serving pregnant/parenting women leaving prison
- Nurturing teen parents
- Serving pregnant women with substance use disorder
- Writing and presenting policies to improve community health
- Developing programs for churches

For all their hard work, each leader receives:

- \$300 monthly gift card for 12 hours of service each month to the project
- Personal life coaching
- · Leadership coaching
- Professional development
- · Professional photograph
- Connections to others that will help personal and professional growth
